Reference correspondence resting with your No. GBSS/PF.26/16 of 15th September 1962.

- I have to point out that the subject of your appointment, with special reference to your service prior to your departure from Aden, has been the subject of lengthy correspondence with the Public Service Commissioner and the Director of Establishments. The delay has been due to the number of complications arising therefrom.
- I have been directed to inform you of Government's decision on this matter; viz:-
 - You will continue to serve in Scale B on promotion until the expiry of the period of punishment in respect of your absence from duty in November 1962. If on the expiry of this period you obtain an entirely satisfactory report, a recommendation will be made to the Public Service Commissioner that you should be confirmed in Scale D.1 with effect from 1st September 1958; and a recommendation will also be submitted to promote you to Scale B with effect from the due date in 1961.

Please let me know if you wish any clarification over this matter.

I received your letter of the 10th July, 1963, just after I had posted mine, which I hope you have received by now.

As you know, the schools are now closed for the summer vacation and most of the Teachers are outside Aden on leave. Your letter had to go first to the Secondary School, Khormakser, and remained there for a couple of days before it came down here to the Headquarters, where I am working during this vacation, before proceeding for the course. I am very glad that I have finalized myself with the Administrative work which has to be done in the future.

I am grateful to you for the valuable information you have given to me on the course. I had a cjance to discuss my future duties with Mr. Ibrahim Luquan who asked me to course to you his sallems and best regards. He told me that my future duties would include the fallowing:-

(1) Establishment: Matters relating to Staff in Junior Grades.

Administrative inspection of Schools.

(3) Maison between Headquarters and Primary and Intermediate Schools.

4) Admission to Schools.

(5) Administration related to Teaching Staff.
(6) Statistics related to admission to Schools.

(7) Evening Classes: Correspondence, Administration, etc.
(8) Administration in Aided Schools in conjunction to Senior Education Officer.

Since you are Sir, in command of a first hand knowledge in respect of the Administration of Education in Aden, I am sure that you will tell me what special subjects I should study.

I think that I have now a fair idea of the nature of the course. Also about the main problem of accommodation (for self, wife and daughter), I feel new released, and am waiting only for your confirmation that the matter has been solved at last. Please Sir, do whatever you think is best for me in this connection and I will be glad to follow your instructions. What I want to avoid is not to be lost in the big city and the strange land!! I shall be grateful also if you will be kind enough and let me knew about the date for the opening of the course and when I should be in London so that I can make the necessary bookings for the three of us.

Dear Hertiey

It was very nice to have a letter from you again. I had heard thatyou were at Reading though I had no details of exactly what you were doing.

Regarding Sultan Abdo Nagi I should have been delighted to see him and help him, but I am going off on a year's research tour much of which of course will be spent in South Arabia, but we commence in Iraq and the Persian 'ulf. I aim at going off on the Lath/15th of this month and it will not be possible to see him.

Since 19-2 I have been compiling a bibliography of Aden and S.w. Arabia in general. The Librarian agreed to take this over from me some ten years ago and it is on cards in the SOAS Library but he has been very slow in producing it. The work has therefore already largely been done, and Sultan Abdo Nagi would be duplicating what I did at considerable pains (!) some time ago. I have been adding to this since, and in fact have a large sheaf of stuff in my study which I must hand over to J.D. Pearson before I go - Pearson is our Librarian.

The bibliography includes works in most languages (with the exception of course of such tongues as Chinese). It would be quite impossible for an Adenese who is not in any way equipped for this work to do it at all adequately. I also went through many periodicals which might not even be accessible to him or which be could only rangeck with great expenditure of time and effort.

What I suggest is this - that he should take this letter to Pearson at the SOAS and ask if he could see the bibliography - which I have in fact made available to other research workers. If Pearson has no objection I see no reason why he should not copy out the material relating to Aden and the Protectorates, but if he is going to publish this or even to reproduce it in fordigraphed sheets I dust insist that some such wording appear as:

The Librarian might like to have his own name on it, or he might like to have that of his assistant who has carried my bibliography on one or two more stages.

I hate to seem dog in the mangerish about this for my view is that we are here to make know redge available and not to withhold it, but I did put in a great deal of work on this bibliography and it has only been heavy teaching and administ - rative commitments that made me realise a long

time ago that I should have to seek for collaborators who could, in fact, take it over from me.

Please let me know what you think about this matter. It would be easier if you or Negi were to write to me at Eastings, 99 High St. Linton, Camba. (Tel. Linton 418) since I shall not be in London very much or very occupied if there.

Where history is concerned Negi vill find quite a lot of material in my recent article in our Bulletin, and of course in my very recent book on the Portuguese off the South Arabian Coast. This may perhaps give him some idea of the complexity of S. Arabian bibliography - I admit when I started on my bibliography I did so in a blitne spirit of ignorance of its extent!

With kindest regards and best wishes to yourself and Mrs Hertley - I expect some of your child ren, if not all, are now at school? I have been in the Sudan fairly regularly since 1958 when I was last in Aden and see Taiyib regularly. You will have heard of the sad death of Ahmad al=Taiyib and perhaps of Mustafa Awad al-K-rim, both students of mine who will have passed through your hands.
